MAINTENANCE

The operative word is WATER - and how to get along without much of it. You can and should re-adjust your watering system to adhere to the new regulations, but are there other things you can do? Here are a few ideas: mulch around your plants, to diminish evaporation, maybe add those crystals that hold water, esp into pots. Some additional out of the box ideas: prune your plants significantly: smaller plants need less water. The best time for pruning is right after blooming finishes. Save & reuse your shower and kitchen sink water once in a while, not for potted plants. In addition: re-evaluate what's growing in your garden and consider "editing". Have you fallen out of love with any of the plants in your garden, have some grown "out of control", are fruit trees no longer producing fruit? This drought year is the perfect excuse for ending relationships with the plants you no longer want or need in your garden. Call it tough love, call it natural selection / survival of the fittest; we need to make choices in life: this is one of them. Someone once said: "Having it all doesn't necessarily mean all at the same time". Consider your garden with this in mind
